To The Students Publishing Company Board of Directors,

As alumni of The Daily Northwestern, we are concerned and disappointed about the SPC's role in ongoing legal action against students who allegedly created a fake front page of The Daily Northwestern in October. Criminal charges against students is a step too far, and we do not support legal proceedings that could seriously damage students' future careers and livelihoods.

We understand that the power to bring or drop charges lies with the State's Attorney's office, but these charges would not have existed without the SPC. Now it is the SPC's responsibility to urge the prosecution to drop or dismiss these charges.

The imitated front pages in October included critiques of Northwestern University and The Daily's coverage on Gaza. It sets a dangerous precedent for The Daily's parent company to initiate criminal proceedings following criticisms of the newspaper.

We alumni believe in the staff's mandate to evaluate the critiques made of their work, to make their own independent editorial decisions, and to create fair, nuanced coverage.

Learning that the staff did not themselves report this incident and is uninvolved in these proceedings is troubling — we stand with the student staffers and their ability to handle campus relationships in the way they best see fit. Charges like these detract from their potential to cover the university fairly and accurately. SPC stepping in to this degree without express agreement from the majority of the editorial board and other staffers removes their credibility as a student-run paper.

SPC primarily has a financial responsibility to the viability of The Daily. But on multiple levels, this action is making it much harder for student journalists to do their jobs. The Daily Northwestern is also a teaching newspaper. This will undoubtedly impact their ability to recruit and retain a full and diverse staff.

This school paper has taught us many skills that we've brought to reputable outlets — lessons that we will carry for the rest of our careers. One of the most important was our ability to make decisions for ourselves and weigh consequences to determine the best course of action for our school paper in the wider context of our university family. While we take our jobs as journalists seriously, student reporters are still members of the Northwestern community first.

The staff did not decide to press charges against these individuals, and they have a lot to lose with the continuation of this case. We urge the SPC to rectify this situation as quickly as possible.

We surveyed signatories on what actions they would personally take to withdraw their support if the SPC does not publicly urge the State's Attorney to drop the charges. **Here are the results**:

- 74 people said they would stop providing donations to support The Daily Northwestern
- 73 people said they would withdraw their engagement with published content (i.e. the website, newsletters and social media)
- 67 people said they would refuse requests to participate in Daily Alumni events (i.e. guest speaking events)
- 65 people said they would stop speaking well of The Daily to colleagues, prospective students or other stake-holders
